




Knowing Statistical Data


When I need help, I ask a librarian.

(Deerfield Public Library)


Based on AMC Theatre and Autism Society's partnership

Lights turned up, sound turned down, captions on, and fidgets available

No registration required; all are welcome with an an invitation to get up, dance, walk, or shout!









Early Intervention Playgroup

(Arlington Heights Public Library)

For children who currently receive therapy services; birth to age 3 with caregiver and siblings

Facilitated by a speech language pathologist with library staff member

Two planned playstations, baby toys, and books







Sensory Storytime

(Plainfield Public Library)

Ages 3 to 9 with caregiver; friends and siblings welcome

Free play, socializing, tactile activities, and storytime for children of all abilities







Club Wonder

(Skokie Public Library)

Ages 3 to 7 with caregiver and siblings

Different class taught by a librarian, therapist, or musician each month









Smart Starts

(Glen Ellyn Public Library)

Ages 3 - 8 of all abilities with parent or caregiver

Drop-in 6 to 8 play stations; encourages socialization and collaboration









Rainbow Therapy Time

(Skokie Public Library)

Ages 7 to 12 with aides; led by volunteers with library staff oversight

Strengthen motor skills, practice social skills, improve language use, decrease anxiety








Friendship Club

(Glenview Public Library)

3rd-8th grade students partnered with 4th-12th grade friendship ambassadors

Local special education teachers and aides provide support in volunteer training and programs

Variety of librarian-led and contract programs that begin and end with social time





Braille Buddies


(Skokie Public Library)

Ages 3rd grade and up

Sighted children learn from itinerant teacher and juvenile Braille readers

Learn how Braille works, receive alphabet card, type names with borrowed braillers, play bingo

Also hosted talent recitals and book discussions



(Batavia Public Library)

Middle school through mid-twenties joined by volunteers of all ages

Special education professionals/parents on site

Movies shown in two places - with and without light







High School Class Visits

(Vernon Area Public Library)

Book-based, mini-lessons that correspond to curriculum







NextGen Programs for Adults Facing Social Challenges

(Schaumburg Public Library)

Adults ages 18+ on the autism spectrum who can attend independently

Game nights, arts, sci-fi/fantasy book shares, improv, martial arts


