Greg is also not available for this meeting, but I have drafted up some thoughts for the board to discuss.

**SUBJECT: Executive Director Report – July, 2021** 

Welcome to our continuing and new board members! I look forward to working with you during this upcoming year. With our tenth anniversary and a new strategic plan to develop, it will certainly be very interesting and fulfilling.

Our monthly reports are organized by the goals of our current strategic plan, to make it easier for the board and members to see progress.

Promote, support, and expand resource sharing to optimize use of tax dollars and other funding and help libraries share resources to the fullest extent possible

### **Resource sharing**

Resource sharing is one of the main jobs of a multitype library system according to the <u>Illinois</u> <u>Library System Act</u> which you can read here. We will also talk about this at the board orientation. Many of the goals of our strategic plan relate to resource sharing.

### **Hugh C. Atkinson Memorial Award**

We are absolutely thrilled to have received this <u>award</u> from the Illinois Library Association. We were completely surprised by the nomination which came from a staff member at a library. As you can see from the explanation of the award, it is very focused on resource sharing. It is truly a great honor and a tribute to the entire RAILS team, board and staff.

#### **Universal Service**

Extension of public library service to unserved residents is specifically mentioned in the System Act as a system responsibility. The Board established a Universal Service Committee 3 years ago to support this work. At the Universal Service Committee in June, the committee asked the board to make a statement about the importance of statewide collaboration and leadership for universal service. We will discuss this at the board meeting.

### Work with libraries of all types to tell the library story

## My Library Is...

During our last strategic planning process, we heard loud and clear from libraries that they need our help telling the "library story," explaining the value of libraries to their communities and funders. As a result, we started the <u>My Library Is</u> project. This has been a very important and popular endeavor over the past couple of years.

### Help libraries be the best they can be

### Consulting, continuing education services

We provide a diverse array of training and consulting services for our member libraries, and some we provide for the entire state, including trustee training and the FOIA/OMA hotline. Right now, we are analyzing how and when to return to in-person training.

### **Prepare libraries for the future**

### **Equity, Diversity and Inclusion update**

The board established an EDI committee in 2020. There are board member representatives as well as member library staff. The committee has divided into subcommittees in order to work on a few priorities; hiring, programming and training. We work with a consultant Elizabeth Lindsay Ryan. Biz has also been actively engaged with training for the RAILS staff to improve our internal culture.

### **Trend spotting**

One of the requests we received during our last planning process was that RAILS provide leadership, such as in the EDI area, but also to be on the lookout for trends. Part of our work in this area includes monthly podcasts where I talk with leaders and innovators in the library field about what we should be on watch for.

## Aim to be the best library system in the country

#### **Recruitment of new RAILS Director of Finance**

Jim Kregor is retiring in January of 2022. We have started putting together the job description and posting for this important recruitment. We are hoping to recruit a diverse and competitive pool. I expect the job will be posted in August and we will begin interviews in the fall.

As a result of Jim's retirement, we have made some internal organizational changes. The Human Resources staff had reported to Jim but we are changing that to report to Monica Harris. This will enable Jim to focus on wrapping up his work and will, hopefully, make it easier to recruit a talented applicant pool. As you can imagine, there is a lot of demand in the marketplace for these jobs.

#### **Board committees**

Every year, after the new board is seated, we reorganize our committees. Since we lost 4 incumbents this year, there will be quite a bit of change to committee membership. At the July board meeting, we will include discussion of the committees and committee charges to aid all board members in making decisions about committee membership.

### **Strategic plan and Tenth Anniversary Celebration**

We are very excited to work on both of these projects. We will have a discussion at the meeting about board involvement in the planning process and an update on anniversary events and ideas.

## **Providing Access to Digital Content/E-Resources/Other Innovative Projects**

#### **Use of RAILS E-Resources**

RAILS' <u>eRead Illinois</u> Axis 360 collection includes e-books and e-audiobooks for adults and children with very reasonable pricing. The <u>BiblioBoard Library</u> is available to everyone in Illinois, courtesy of RAILS, regardless of whether they have a library card. Items on this platform have no holds, no waits, and can be accessed simultaneously.

The following tables show usage of eRead Illinois and the BiblioBoard Library in June and for FY 2021.

### eRead Illinois Renewals/Enrollment

The eRead Illinois renewal/enrollment period concluded in June, with 972 libraries subscribing for FY 2022. A total of 694 schools (buildings), 249 public, 23 academic, and six specialized libraries are taking advantage of the very affordable collection of over 56,000 e-book and e-audiobooks for all ages.

### **eRead Illinois Grant Update**

RAILS received a \$125,000 e-book grant from the Illinois State Library last fall to purchase K-12 content for our eRead Illinois Axis 360 collection. Grant spending ended in June. The following table shows total grant purchases.

Purchases included items chosen by Baker & Taylor's collection specialists and additional copies of popular materials. RAILS received 121 suggestions from member libraries and most of those items were added as well.

## **Explore More Illinois Update**

Explore More Illinois is RAILS' online cultural pass program. Cardholders at participating Illinois public libraries can take advantage of discounts at museums, park districts, historical societies, zoos, arts centers, recreational facilities, and other attractions. As of July 8, 372 libraries (306 RAILS libraries and 66 Illinois

Heartland Library System libraries) participate.

RAILS continues to recruit new attractions for the program and to restart offers with attractions that have reopened with the lifting of COVID-19 restrictions. As of July 8, 20 attractions participate.

RAILS staff met with CARLI (Consortium of Academic and Research Libraries in Illinois) staff on July 8 to discuss the implications of expanding Explore More Illinois to community colleges using ALMA, CARLI's ILS (integrated library system). We are planning a follow-up meeting for August.

## **Improving Physical Delivery Services**

#### **RAILS Delivery RFP Update**

In May, RAILS released an RFP for delivery and sorting services. Submissions were due on July 12, and RAILS hosted a bid opening at 5 p.m. on that day. We received four proposals from: Tech Logic, Lyngsoe Systems, Continental Transportation Solutions, and statcourier.

RAILS staff will review the proposals and make a recommendation to the RAILS Board at the September 24 board meeting. Contract negotiaions will begin following board approval.

### **Providing Greater Purchasing Power**

### **RAILS Deals & Discount Result in Big Savings for Member Libraries**

RAILS partners with vendors to offer special, deeply discounted rates for RAILS member libraries. These discounts resulted in over \$1 million in savings for members in FY 2021.

EBSCO deals saved 120 libraries over \$500,000. Other impactful deals included Communico, OpenGov, PatronPoint, PressReader, Quill, and Swank Movie Licensing, which combined for over \$300,000 in savings for participating libraries. Discounts are also available for items purchased through participating library supply catalogs. We will continue to work with vendors

and our members to provide advantageous, consistent, and transparent pricing for RAILS libraries.

### **Career Online High School (COHS) Update**

<u>COHS</u> is a vocation-based high school completion program that enables libraries to offer adult learners accredited high school diplomas.

RAILS staff attended a Rockford Public Library COHS graduation on June 24. Twelve students received diplomas. In total, 125 adult Illinois students have earned a high school diploma via the COHS program.

RAILS also hosted two COHS networking group meeting for members on July 13. Six attended.



### **Sharing Best Practices with Consortia Purchasing Managers Nationwide**

Leila Heath, Director of Library Resources and Programs, met with Consortia Purchasing Managers from <u>Califa</u> (California), <u>Florida Academic Library Services Cooperative</u>, <u>Midwest Collaborative for Library Services</u> (MCLS), and <u>OhioNet</u> in June. The group discussed issues and procedures related to purchasing across large, multitype consortia. The group meets bimonthly.

### RAILS Online Roundtable: "Succession Planning for Trustees," August 11

RAILS is holding an event specifically designed for library trustees on Wednesday, August 11 from noon to 1 p.m. It will include a short presentation by Amanda Standerfer, Independent Consultant with Standerfer Consulting/Fast Forward Libraries, and a Zoom breakout room with the opportunity to connect with other RAILS library trustees. There will also be a Q&A, and a portion of the program will be recorded.

On Tuesday, August 3 from 2 to 3 p.m., RAILS will host an online roundtable via Zoom for all Illinois library staff. The event will include a live tutorial on using Adobe products like InDesign and Photoshop to create quick, easy graphics. It will also be recorded. There were 39 registrants at the time of this writing.

### **Advocating for Libraries**

### July Meeting with AISLE, IHLS, and ILA Focuses on Data

RAILS staff meet monthly with representatives from the Association of Illinois School Library Educators (AISLE), Illinois Heartland Library System (IHLS), and the Illinois Library Association (ILS) to discuss shared concerns affecting school libraries.

The July 6 meeting focused on existing data on Illinois school libraries and how we might acquire additional data to better understand the school library landscape. Patricia Burg, Library Program Specialist at the Illinois State Library, joined us for this conversation. The next "AISLE Partnership" meeting is on August 10.

# Aiming to Be the Best Library System

**Modeling Best Practices & Innovation** 

### **SimplyE Update**

<u>SimplyE</u> is an open source e-reader and e-book discovery app developed by the New York Public Library (NYPL). It allows patrons of libraries with multiple e-book collections to access all of these collections through one interface. RAILS has been closely monitoring SimplyE's progress, including attending monthly meetings to discuss technical issues and other developments. The <u>Pinnacle Library Cooperative</u> test-piloted SimplyE and assisted with trouble-shooting.

The SimplyE project has been plagued with app development issues. Moving forward, NYPL will retain the SimplyE brand, and concentrate on app stability, particularly within its own library network. <a href="LYRASIS"><u>LYRASIS</u></a> will continue developing the concept through <a href="The Palace Project"><u>The Palace Project</u></a>, which plans to launch in fall 2021. While neither SimplyE nor The Palace Project are ready for widespread deployment at RAILS, we will continue to stay abreast of ongoing developments as these interfaces promise to ultimately provide a better user experience for library patrons.

## **RAILS Staff News**

### American Library Association (ALA) Annual Conference Report

Several RAILS staff members attended the June 24 - 29 ALA virtual conference. There were many informative sessions on current topics such as navigating librarianship through COVID-19 and looking at improving the organizational health of library organizations through an EDI lens, as well as meetings of the E-Books Interest Group and the Consortium Management Interest Group.

Monica Harris, RAILS Associate Executive Director, is an ALA At-Large Councilor. Key Council discussions at the conference focused on ALA's <u>Forward Together</u> governance recommendations, the association's budget, a resolution in support of open educational resources (OER), Library of Congress subject headings, and patron privacy. The Council will resume in-person meetings mixed with a virtual hybrid approach, at the <u>LibLearnX</u> ALA Conference in San Antonio, Texas from January 20 – 24, 2022.
