RAILS Report

RAILS Climate Team

RAILS Continuing Education and Training

Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs) and the Library: An Introduction to Trauma-informed Library Service (Zoom - Wednesday, May 25, 2022 – 1-2:30pm)

This session will provide an overview of research into adverse childhood experiences (ACEs) and the lifelong consequences of trauma. Special attention will be paid to the behavioral responses to trauma commonly observed among public library patrons. We will explore ways that libraries can move to become trauma-informed, providing customer service that addresses the needs of the whole person. Please note that while ACEs occur during childhood, the repercussions are felt throughout our lives; this session is not specific to children and youth.

Summer in the Streets: The Urban Lit Movement (Zoom – Tuesday, August 9, 2022 – 2-4pm)

Join us on Tuesday, August 9, 2022 from 2-4pm on Zoom for Summer in the Streets: The Urban Lit Movement. The Connected Library: Vetting and Partnering with Social Service Providers: As we have witnessed the social, financial, and mental health challenges of our patrons escalate during the COVID-19 pandemic, libraries must connect and build relationships with local providers focused on these needs so that we may serve our communities as effectively as possible.
